In the same establishment of the undermilitary Brigades will be as stated in the schedule upon certain of the battalions ordered either to proceed abroad or to return home or about to return home—the 1st and 2nd Battalions 6th Regiment, 2nd Battalion 25th Regiment, 2nd Battalion 33rd, 1st Battalion 29th, and 1st Battalion 35th Regiments—each to consist of 31 officers, 58 non-commissioned officers, and 820 rank and file, making a total of all ranks of 909 and about to embark for service—the 2nd Battalion 16th Regiment and the 1st Battalion 34th Regiment—30 officers, 66 non-commissioned officers, and 820 rank and file; total, 916 ranks; the 1st Battalion 25th Regiment, 1st Battalion 34th, and the 1st Battalion 35th Regiments—each 31 officers, 66 non-commissioned officers, and 820 rank and file; total of all ranks, 916 ranks; depots of the above regiments each to consist of 3 officers, 27 non-commissioned officers, and 140 of all ranks.
