A resolution was passed against the union, £56 4s 6d. The Board were informed that the amount due to the Kilrush union under the Cattle Act was £54 13s 11½d.—The following resolution was read to the clerk by Mr. Reeves, J.P., and the Board, was read:—"Kildare, 1st June, 1876.—My dear Sir, I report in the *Limerick Chronicle* of the 26th ult. that you left the Board-room on Saturday last. The Board adjourned, a resolution was passed, summoning a special meeting on the 10th inst. to discuss a petition in favour of the Bill. As I had conducted the meeting in accordance with the rules laid down by the Board, I must respectfully protest against the conduct of the Kilrush Board in adjourning after it had been adjourned; and I trust you will be good enough to have my protest entered on the minutes.—Yours faithfully, R.
