Wanting for the sake of argument, that
 discovery is correct, it will not in the
 my position that the bishops of the
 Church alone possess the succession from
 . For through those conforming prelates,
 they were two or more, that succession
 passed down uninterruptedly to the episco-
 pacy of the present day. The Roman hierarchy in
 fact, on the other hand, can never claim
 the ancient Church of Ireland. The
 members of their line were consecrated, not by
 Italian or Spanish prelates; and so,
 excluded, the vast majority of the Marian
 refused to conform, they failed to trans-
 fer the orders to others.

The real historical facts are these:—Soon
 after the accession of Elizabeth, in 1560, A. D., a
 synod and convocation was held in Dublin, in
 which Papal supremacy was abolished and the
 jurisdiction of the Crown over all estates in
 Ireland restored. An Act of Uniformity was
 passed, by which all ministers were enjoined
 to use the Book of Common Prayer. This parlia-
 ment was attended by 3 archbishops (the see of
 Kildare being vacant) and 17 bishops. The list
 of their names is preserved at the Rolls
 Office, and it has been published in Vol. II.
 of the *Annals Relating to Ireland* printed for the
 Royal Society. Of these bishops two
 refused to take the oath of supremacy, viz—
 Meath and Levegh of Kildare. These
