NO. 4—IRISH LIGHTHOUSE NOTICE TO MARINERS.

EAST COAST OF IRELAND ALTERATIONS and ADDITIONS in the AGE of BURFORD, KISH, CODLING RIDGE, and INDIA BANKS

The Commissioners of Irish Lights hereby give Notice, that owing to the changes that take place in the formation of the above Banks about to make the following Alterations in the Buoyage thereof.

The Alterations will be as follows:—
BURFORD NORTH BUOY.

Now a First Class Conical Buoy, with staff and globe black and white chequered as before, in the same position.

BURFORD SOUTH BUOY.

Will be shifted half a cable to the West in its present position, painted the same as hitherto, but the staff and globe will be black and white. It will be moored in four fathoms water. The Kish, Bray, and Codling Banks will be considered as one danger.

And the following Alterations will be made in the Buoyage:—

KISH BANK, NORTH, OR NO. 1 BUOY

A First Class Conical Buoy, painted black and white, will mark the North extremity of these Banks. Its position will be $\frac{1}{2}$ W. of its present position, in six fathoms water.

KISH BANK, NO. 2.

A First Class Conical Buoy, painted black and white, will be shifted $\frac{1}{2}$ South $\frac{1}{2}$ West of its present position, in six fathoms water. The following compass marks and bearings:—
Bailey Lighthouse, N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
Mapas Obelisk, N.W. by W.
