Each order for the wine in flagons (equal to twelve bottles) deliveries will be made, the first immediately on receipt of the remainder from time to time. The price of four flagons is charge of 5s. is made for the flagon the property of the customer, and in full when the empty is returned continuing their supplies will be for the wine itself on all subsequent

The receipt for the remittance respectively, will be accompanied one of which must be returned every flagon of wine. This is punctual delivery, and customers leave out with their servants days that a supply is wanted the porter being not to deliver receiving a ticket.

Only one flagon being delivered holders of tickets are requested or days on which they desire strictness being made as to the holding good.

Parties wishing a delivery flagon at a time, must send every additional flagon.
