

NOTICE TO MESSRS. CHARLES BARRINGTON, CROKER BARRINGTON, and WILLIAM BARRINGTON.

A very large and influential meeting of the proprietors of the Glenstal estates and others in the neighbourhood was held on Sunday, the 8th instant, at the National School, at Murroe, for the purpose of making an arrangement as to the best mode of celebrating the joy they felt at the safe arrival from America of the National Regatta at Philadelphia of Messrs. Charles Barrington, Croker Barrington, and William Barrington.

He said to offer in some substantial manner in a manner worthy of themselves, these gentlemen, the sons of their good landlord, returned from America, a testimony of their affection for the country. It was often unfortunately his duty to rebuke the tenant farmers as he saw round about him denounce the wrongs and the tyranny of the landlord, but to-day he could testify in the bosom of his heart to the kindness and consideration of Mr. Barrington as a landlord.
