GROUSE SHOOTING.—The reports as to the prospects of the grouse shooting season, which commenced on Saturday, are on the whole very favourable. From Clare we learn that the birds, if not very numerous, are strong and healthy, and the same reports arrive from various sporting districts throughout the country. A correspondent writing from Newry says that "the 12th of August, so anxiously looked forward to by sportsmen, brought with it not a drop of rain and scarcely a breath of air to cool the hills or heather. Nevertheless, in our neighbourhood the ardent lovers of sport, were early at their work, and the quick reports on the moors and hill-side soon gave evidence that their exertions would not be bootless. Game in the various places where they congregate most, were found more plentiful than usual, the parching weather, so injurious to the highland crops, having nourished and made the young birds strong and vigorous. After the first few volleys they became shy, several packs, led by the old cocks, not turning up again; during the day several coveys of partridges appeared, the young birds taking the wing with great vigour at this early season. Later in the day the game was more plentiful than in the morning, and good bags were secured. At Newtowphamilton, as well as in this part of the county Down, there is promise of an abundant supply of game, and sportsmen will have a larger return for their exertions than they have enjoyed for many years."

#### FATAL ACCIDENT.

Mr. Matthew H. De Courcy, city coroner, and a jury sat this morning in the city court house, for the purpose of enquiring into the circumstances attending the death of a blind man named Michael Ryan, who accidentally lost his life on Sunday by falling into the river, in consequence of the swivel bridge contiguous to Wellesley bridge being open when he attempted to pass over it.
