DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET, January 4.—(L. Cuffe and Son's Report.—With about 600 more cattle, we had a much duller trade for beef, every description of beasts selling at fully 20s per head less than last week's prices. Supply of sheep larger by 1,800; trade in consequence much slower, yet we cannot quote prices lower. Prime beef 70s to 75s per cwt, secondary and inferior 60s to 67s 6d; prime wether 5d per lb, ewe 7 1/2 to 8 1/2. Beasts, 2,642; sheep, 5,754.
