at a reduction of 10 to 20 per cwt.; numbers of sheep also
much larger; trade, notwithstanding, was unaltered, and
rates unchanged; good wethers also maintained full rates;
inferior sorts slightly reduced in prices. Prices—Prime beef,
7s to 8s per cwt.; secondary and inferior, 6s to 7s;
wether, 9d per lb.; ewe, 8d to 9d; lambs, 2s to 4s each.
Supply—Beasts, 1,317; sheep, 7,238.
