Under the circumstances the decision of the court below must be reversed and the judgment arrested.

The Court pronounced no opinion whether the book was the most filthy and obscene ever pub lished, or the most innocent one.

The Lord Justices Brett and Cotton concurred and judgment on the defendant was arrested.
