MISCELLANEOUS.

Last evening a large meeting was held at Kiltuba, near Longhrea, for the purpose of forwarding the land agitation, at which were passed resolutions pledging those present never to cease their exertions until they had secured the total abolition of landlordism, and asking Mr Mitchell-Henry to retire from the representation of Galway county since he declines to co-operate with Mr Parnell and the active section of the Irish party.

The 48th Regiment has been added to the list, published recently by the Quartermaster-General's Department in India, of the Infantry battalions which will return to England during the present relief season. Although the 73rd and 83rd Regiments have been placed under orders for embarkation, there seems to exist some doubt as to whether they will proceed home, and the friends of the two corps would therefore do well not to calculate upon their appearance in England until information reaches them.

The programme of reliefs to be carried out by the several transports to be engaged this season in conveying troops from India has not yet been completed. All that is known at present is that the Euphrates will embark the 48th Regiment (at Bombay) on October 26, the 59th embarking in the Orates on October 31, the 2nd Battalion 1st Regiment in the Malabar on November 5, the 1st Batt 5th Fusiliers in the Jumna on November 9, and the 1st Battalion 6th Regiment in the Seacres (at Aden) on December 13.

Second Lieutenant Edgar Vincent, Coldstream Guards, who has been acting for some time past as private secretary to Lord Edmund FitzMaurice, has been retained at Constantinople as Assistant Military Secretary, and has gone to Vienna for a short time on an important mission connected with his post. The most flattering accounts are furnished of Mr Vincent's services, and his selection for duty with the Embassy is said to have been a well-deserved acknowledgment of his zeal and ability.
