CITY POLICE COURT—WEDNESDAY.

(Before Mr M'Carthy, R.M.) Thomas Riedy was brought up in custody of Constable Treacy charged with having been ab- sent from the last three trainings of the City of Limerick Militia. The prisoner stated that he was in America and could not come over. Mr M'Carthy said he had no alternative but to order the accused to pay a fine of forty shillings and costs, with the alternative of two months' im- prisonment. The fine was paid.
