**ACCIDENT IN THE HUNTING
FIELD.**

Inquest on the remains of poor Mr Ashe,
who was killed by a fall from his horse
hunting with the Muskerry Foxhounds was
held yesterday at 3 o'clock. One of the witnesses
testified that he saw Mr Ashe ride the spirited horse
along the public road between
and Cloghroe, and that when
at a corner of the thoroughfare the
horse became entangled in the bit. Mr. Ashe,
who was riding long spurs, placed his right hand in the
mane and reached forward to disen-
gagle the bridle. Unfortunately the spurs
caught on the horse's sides, and he plunged and
threw his rider beyond the pommel of the saddle.
At the time the music of the hounds could be dis-
cerned in the distance, and the brute dashed
at a gallop. Of course Mr Ashe was power-
less to stop its progress. He endeavoured to re-
seat in the pigskin, but in his attempt to
do this he drove deeper and deeper the spurs into
the animal's sides. At length becoming
completely exhausted he was thrown to
the ground, his head coming in contact with the
ground which was close to him. When Cour-
tenay was captured his sides were severely
lacerated by the spurs, and this bears out one point
of the testimony of the witness.
