SHIPPING CASUALTIES. Intelligence was received in Southampton that a large steamer supposed to have sunk off Portland on Thursday night. The steamer, which collided with her, was a three-masted vessel, bound for the Magdeburg was much damaged. The collision occurred in a fog, the S.S.W. of Portland, and the Magdeburg's boats remained on the spot several hours, and no cries, and saw nothing of the other vessel. The blow was struck. No definite information has been received at Lloyd's with reference to the steamer which it was feared went off Portland on Thursday, after colliding with the Magdeburg. The captain of the Pinzon, arrived at Gravesend this morning from the Magdeburg, reports, however, that on the 23rd he came into collision with a steamer between the Magdeburg and the Start.
