William Fitzgibbon, a respectable youth, was brought up on remand charged with the murder of Daniel Quaine, an old man, at Ballyr, on the 8th of November. Mr Leahy, solicitor, appeared for the accused. The Bench said they had no alternative but to send the case for trial to the next Assizes. Mr Murphy expressed his regret that the court did not do otherwise, as he believed the young man never intended to injure Quaine, but was provoked by his outrageous language. Mr Leahy said he would have to apply to the Court of Queen's Bench to admit his client to bail, as the Bench had not that power, but he would do so at the trial that his client was not the cause of Quaine's death.

The next cases called were the Queen at the instance of Constable Reid, of Ballinacurra, against Patrick Lynch and Michael Twomey for assault on Michael Donovan on the 2nd December at Ross.

Mr Fitzgerald, clerk to Mr Kenny, solicitor, appeared for the court for an adjournment for him as he was absent in Dublin.

Mr W. Leahy, solicitor, applied on behalf of Patrick Molloy, of Rossbrien, to have Patrick and Michael Donovan committed to gaol or bound to good behaviour for threatening his client with violence. On Thursday last, after the conclusion of a case against the Donovans, in which he was complainant and in which defendants were fined £5 and £10, Molloy was attacked by them and threatened with violence, and was in terror of his life. Molloy gave evidence to this effect, and Patrick Donovan was bound to the peace for 6 months. The Bench, in the cases against Patrick Lynch and Michael Twomey for assaulting Michael Donovan, said that this morning the defendant was in bed in hospital, and unable to attend, and he asked for an adjournment until Friday next.

The application was granted. Mr Grady was sentenced to a month's imprisonment for stealing cozzers at Ballykeeffe, the property of Mr Hayes, farmer.

REPAIRING AND CLEANSING OF THE CITY.

On this day the Cleansing and Repairing Subcommittee of the Improvement Department of the Council of the Corporation of this city assembled in the Treasurer's office at the Town Hall in accordance with the resolution passed on Tuesday by that department to consider the question of repairing and cleansing the streets. Present—The High Sheriff (in the person of Aldermen Phillips, J.P., Hogan, and Councillors Boyd, J.P., Hosford, Nolan, Bassett, O'Donnell, Reardon, D. F. O'Connell, O'Connor, Anglim, Syan, O'Sullivan, and Mayor elect; Bernal, Wallace, and The Town Clerk, the City Surveyor, and Constable attended the meeting.

After some discussion, the committee came to a resolution of abandoning for the present the plan of contracting with any person for the repairing and cleansing of the streets; but to refer the Council to act upon the report of the cleansing and repairing sub-committee framed some months ago, but not adopted by the Council, to divide the wards into seven districts, and to employ a number of sweepers and carters attached to each ward, over whom a ganger would be placed in each ward, and it was agreed also that two or more persons—volunteering for the purpose—should have superintendence of a district, and to walk through it occasionally to see that the carts and sweepers and sweepers of
