AL ACCIDENT IN THE HUNTING FIELD.

Inquest on the remains of poor Mr Ashe, who was killed by a fall from his horse hunting with the Muskerry Foxhounds was held yesterday at 3 o'clock. One of the witnesses said he saw Mr Ashe ride the spirited horse over along the public road between Cloghroe, and that when near a corner of the thoroughfare he got entangled in the bit. Mr. Ashe, using spurs, placed his right hand in the mane and reached forward to dislodge the bridle. Unfortunately the spurs struck the horse's sides, and he plunged and his rider beyond the pommel of the saddle, the music of the hounds could be heard in the distance, and the brute darted off gallop. Of course Mr Ashe was powerless to stop its progress. He endeavoured to re-seat in the pigskin, but in his attempt to do so drove deeper and deeper the spurs into animal's sides. At length becoming exhausted he was thrown to ground, his head coming in contact with the poll which was close to him. When found he was captured his sides were severely cut by the spurs, and this bears out one point in the testimony of the witness.
