### SPLENDID RUN WITH THE LIMERICK (MR. J. GUBBINS') STAG HOUNDS.

Owing to the long reign of King Frost, the city of the Violated Treaty had not for a long time been treated to a rare meet of this excellent pack; so that the tryst for Saturday, 5th instant, was naturally very anxiously looked forward to, and brought to the favourite rendezvous—Crecora Cross—a large gathering of the right sort, all eager for the fray. The usual law granted, Mr Reilly, in the much regretted absence of the master, assumed the horn, and a trot of ten minutes brought us to Maryville Cross, close to which the hounds were laid on, and at once setting down to a burning scent, flashed off towards Fedamore, nearing which, a head to the right took us across the Rathmore road, on to the old castle, where "left incline and Castle Ievers" became the order of the day, and at a tremendous pace the chase was continued over a line of banks and ditches unrivalled in this stag-hunting arena. Close to Castle Ievers a slight cneck was experienced, but a cast to the right quickly got the hounds on the line, which lies towards Abbeyville, through the Devil's acre, Clorane fox covert, and Tullyvinn, finishing up eventually close to Islandmore.
