FUNERAL OF A LDERMAN O'CALLAGHAN

The funeral obsequies of this much-lamented gentleman were celebrated this morning at Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, where the interment took place. The funeral cortege left the deceased's residence at eleven o'clock, and was remarkably lengthy, headed by the Very Rev Dean O'Brien, P.P. V.G.; the Rev W. Moloney, P.P. St Munchin's; and eight other R. C. clergymen. Then came the hearse containing the coffin, with a number of male relatives, including Messrs O'Callaghan, sons, and Leahy and Cantillon, sons-in-law of the deceased. The Mayor, Alderman Quin, D.L., and a large number of the members of the Town Council, walked next in processional order, together with members of the local magistracy and other leading citizens, and the procession closed with a long array of carriages of the gentry of the city and neighbourhood. At the cemetery the coffin was removed to the mortuary chapel, where the burial service was read by Dean O'Brien, Rev W. Moloney, P.P. assisted by the other clergymen, and at its conclusion the coffin was conveyed to and placed in the family vault.
