At eleven o'clock on Thursday night, an attempt was made to blow up the barracks at Chester. An explosion was effected at the back of the barracks, and upon search a black valise was found still burning at the foot of the wall. A hole had been dug in the wall, and a bag filled with gunpowder had been placed in it. Very little damage, however, was done. Several men who are suspected were arrested.
