THE SHOCKING ACCIDENT AT CARRIGORAN.

The terrible incident which took place at
about three o'clock on the afternoon of Tuesday
last, a brief notice of which we published that
evening, has cast a gloom not merely over the
immediate district of Carrigoran, but throughout
the entire county. The particulars of this melan-
choly event are as follows—In the midst of the
storm which raged with such intensity during
the entire of Tuesday last, the deceased, ac-
companied by Mr Crowe, of Cahercalla, launched
a small boat upon the lake, the waters of
which were at that moment in a state of
boisterous fury, and having got into it proceeded
some distance from the shore, his companion
wisely remaining upon the land. After a few
minutes buffeting with the waves the little skiff
was overturned, and Mr Fitzgerald, who appears
to have been a fair swimmer was thrown into
the water. Though not far from the land, in
consequence of the violence of the waves, the
deceased found it impossible to contend against
them, and changing his course, made for the
Newmarket side of the lake. Upon seeing this
Mr Crowe rushed round as quick as possible to
give him assistance, but before he had made the
circuit, he saw his companion sink beneath the
waters. The moment the terrible catastrophe
became known, a large number of people
assembled for the purpose of rendering assistance
to recover the body, and though various appliances
were immediately used it was not until the fol-
lowing morning that the remains were discovered.
The deceased was much regretted by all classes,
his suavity of manners and gentlemanlike bear-
ing, particularly endearing him to the tenantry
upon the Carrigoran estate, to which he was heir.
