LORD BEACONSFIELD'S ILLNESS.

London, 9 a.m.

During the night Lord Beaconsfield has been worse, and his condition has again become serious. The spasms recommenced, and Dr was sent for towards morning. However, his condition rallied, and a change for the better took place, but so anxious became his medical advisers that Sir William Jenner was most hastily summoned, and arrived in Curzon-street at eight o'clock. A long medical consultation followed, when Sir William and Drs Kidd and Quain, what result is not yet known, but it is said that the noble earl in no way improves. Sir Wm Jenner left the house at twenty minutes after 8, and is expected to return again during the day. Mr Rowton (Mr Montague Corry) arrived at Curzon Cross shortly after 7 a.m. and being apprised of the change in Lord Beaconsfield's condition, he drove at once to Curzon-street. Dr Quain arrived at Curzon-street about half-past eight, at which time Lord Beaconsfield was easier, and enjoying a little sleep. He will return for the usual con-

LIMERICK DISTRICT LUNCHEON CONTRACTS FOR NEW MILK.

The Board of Governors of the Limerick District Asylum, at their meeting on TUESDAY, the 12th April, invited tenders for supplying the Institution with Milk for Twelve Months from the 1st May, 1882, at — per quart.

The Milk to yield at least ten cwt according to the lactometers of the Institution, to be delivered in such quantities as may be required.

Tenders will, at the same time, be received for an extra supply of Milk on contract from 1st May to 1st November.
