It is with deep regret we live to announce the demise of this venerable gentleman, at his residence. Ballinacura House, yesterday in the S4 year of his age. Seldom has the death of any member of the aristogracy of this county created a wider or more jutense feeling of regret than that of this estimable and much lamented gentleman. Of a retiring disposition whose family circle was the society he most cared to enjoy, still he was endowed with faculties of the head and heart which created for him not only the respect but the esteem of those in every sphere of life who had any knowledge of him. He was the eldest son of the late Hon. George Eyre Massy, of Riversdale, for many years resident in Georgestreet, who was the second son of Hugh, second Baron Massy, of Duntrileague, near Knocklong, in the peerage of Ireland, and was consequently a near kinsman of the present peer of the name, and descended along with the resent Lord Clarina from Sir Hugh Massy, who settled in Ireland, and held a military command in this country some 250 years ago. He was perhaps the oldest magistrate in this county, and served the office of High Sheriff in 1853. He married the only daughter of the late Mr Harding, of Chery-grove. Mr Massy remained at Riversdale till about twelve years ago, when he came to reside in ar this city. He was a constant attendent it the County Petry Sessions. The funeral will take place on Thurs-day morning, when at 9.30 the coffin containing his remains will be conveyed to the Railway Terminus, and thence by the 10,30 train via Charleville to Knocklong station for interment at Duntrilengue, the family burial place. A large number of the leading families of the county go into mourning for the deceased gentleman.

## INQUESTS.

On yesterday Mr Coroner DeCourcy, with a jury, held three inquests into cases of sudden death. The first was on John Carey, a painter, who died on Sunday while coming out of the Industrial School on the Roxboro Road. It was ascertained that he died from heart disease, and there was a verdict accordingly. The second inquest was held on a boy named James Walsh, who died from similar causes in Hunt's-lane, and the jury returned the same verdict. The third inquest was held on the body of James Connors, a publican, residing at Ballyhill, between Loughill and Glin. He was about 80 years of age. He came to Limerick in the morning by the Foyn's train, and transacted his business in his usual health. He went to the terminus at half-past one, and entered a carriage to return home, but shortly after aards he was found in a dying condition and conveyed to the waiting room where he was attended by a priest, the Rev Mr M Loughlin, Redemptorist, and Dr. O'Connor, but he died in fifteen minutes afterwards. The verdict was death from natural causes.
