

League, and Mr John Stack, V.P., watched the sales on the part of the tenants. An extra military and police force were drafted into the town from Tralee and Limerick, a special train bringing 60 infantry, under Captain Ellis, from the former town, and 40 of the 20th Hussars, under Lieutenant Neason, from the latter. There were also 100 members of the Constabulary in addition to those already stationed here, under Sub-Inspectors Mayne, of Cork, and King, of Listowel. A company of the 107th Regt., at present quartered here, was also in attendance. (The whole force), under the command of Captain R A Massey, R M, Listowel. The demeanour of the people throughout was most bellicose, and but for the timely action of the authorities in bringing an extra military and constabulary force into requisition, it is more than likely that blood would have been spilt. Shortly after the sale began, a stone was thrown by somebody in the gallery in the direction of the sheriff, who occupied a position on the bench, and was very near striking a clergyman, who sat near him. The sheriff then ordered to have the gallery cleared, which was immediately done, and the sales proceeded with. The first farm that was put up was that of Wm Reidy; for which Mr Goddard bid £27 16s 6d, and was accordingly declared the purchaser. The claim was for £25 11s 5d, but when offered by Mr Harrington on the part of the tenant, the sheriff refused to entertain it, which called forth a lively passage at arms between Mr Harrington and himself, the former gentleman threatening to take an action against the sheriff for refusing to do so. Other farms were then put up for sale, and in most of the cases Mr Harrington stepped forward on the part of the tenants and paid down the amount claimed, which was handed him by the defendants. Mr Goddard took two other farms, which he succeeded in getting pretty cheap. In one case there was an adjournment of the sale of a farm for a fortnight, because the tenant stepped forward and said he had settled
