**HOMICIDE IN LIMERICK.**

The report of a murder of a rather melancholy character startled the people of Limerick last night, and in consequence of the smothered feel- ing of apprehension prevailing after the recent riots which have taken place here, the fear was at first entertained that the affair was of an agrarian character, and that it was a country bailiff attending the Quarter Sessions who was the victim of foul play. This morning, however, it became known that the unfortunate object of a revolver bullet was a labouring man named John Moloney, who would seem to have preferred herd- ing with a street baud than living on the fruits of honest industry. It appears that between nine and ten o'clock last night a notorious street nuisance name Mary Jane O'Connor, frequently before the magistrates, and tried at quarter sessions and assizes courts for robbery, picked up with a commercial traveller named Pearson, from Cork, and they having had a dispute in Brunawick street in the vicinity of the Wellesley Bridge, he having accused her of robbery, and the deceased Moloney, who was her paramour, and lay in wait for an opportunity to interfere for his own purposes, saw that opportunity, and went to take part with the girl O'Connor, when Pearson it is said shoved him back with his left hand, drew a revolver from his pocket and shot him just between the stomach and the chest, two inches above the naval, causing him to fall. Persons in the Catholic Literary Institute heard the shot, went out; ran across to where deceased was lying, and removed him into the hall. He was asked who shot him, and he said he did not know, that it was by a civilian and not by a policeman. Dr Bourke of George street, and Dr O'Connor of the workhouse, attended the unfortunate man, who died in about twenty minutes from internal hemorrhage. The body was conveyed to Barrington's Hospital. The constabulary, on hearing of the sad occurrence succeeded in arresting a commercial traveller named J Smith Pearson of Cork, whom the girl O'Connor identified as the person who shot her companion. He admitted having done so, but in self-defence, he said.
