officers of the law were almost out of sight. It was even suggested to groan them. John Maher and his workman were the only persons evicted. He is one of the largest tenants on the property, and was evicted for non-payment of rent. The agent and nephew of the landlord were present, and took up possession of Maher's house and farm. To-day the same force proceeded to the same place of destitution, with ambulance carts, water, provisions, beer, and everything needed for the supply of an army in an enemy's country, so that there was no necessity to depend on the shopkeepers of the neighbourhood for supplies of refreshments. The evictions were to be completed to-day, and caretakers left in charge of the evicted tenements sufficiently numerous to prevent expulsion.

### THE HOMICIDE AT OLD PALLAS.

On Sunday last Timothy O'Brien, who was so badly assaulted on Monday week, with a stirrup-iron, after his return from the fair of Hospital, died from the effects of the injuries he received. A man named Birmingham was arrested last week for causing the injuries to O'Brien, and remanded to prison. The inquest on deceased was held to-day by Mr Coroner Costello.

Mr Henry, the County Inspector of Constabulary, attended the inquest, and Mr Connolly, solicitor, for the man in custody. The widow of deceased, constable of the police, and Dr Ryan, New Pallas, and a boy named Connell were severally examined, after which Mr Connolly addressed the jury for the accused, and they found the following verdict:—"We find Patrick Birmingham is guilty of manslaughter in self defence and that there is no evidence against Patrick Collins." The latter has been discharged.

### FAIRS.

**RATHKEALE.**—This fair, which was one of the old established ones, was, both in point of quantity of stock and slowness of purchasing, one of the poorest exhibited which has been held in the locality for many years. The chief attention seems to have been concentrated upon yearling stock, which were greedily purchased at prices varying from £7 to £8 10s, while two year old heifers scarcely obtained a purchaser, the prices nominally being £9 each. Three year old heifers sold at from £12 to £14, but the buying was of the most languid character. There was but little beef on sale, and that little was very inferior. Springers were eagerly bought up at from £16 to £22 each. Lambs fetched from 30s to 44s, and prime mutton was high in proportion.

**KILDYSART.**—The important July fair of this village was held here on Friday last, and though the green was well supplied with stock of all kinds, the business transacted was rather small, and the prices for all stock, with the exception of sheep, were decidedly tending downwards. Yearlings were scarcely enquired for, and the few which changed hands were at prices ranging from £5 to £7. Two years old heifers were in somewhat better demand at figures averaging from £8 to £11, and three years old from £12 to £14. A few fat cattle were purchased at £15, £17 and £18. There seemed to be considerable eagerness to purchase sheep, and in this department there was a considerable business done in hoggets at £2 and upwards. Ewes from £2 5s to £2 10s, and fat sheep at £3 5s. Bacon pigs rated at from 52s to 55s per cent, and bonhams at from 20s to 25s each.
