

the Press Association representative met Mr Lowell, the American Minister, at 10 o'clock this morning, and ascertained from him that in addition to the telegrams which he had sent to His Majesty and the Prince of Wales, a third one was forwarded to Earl Granville with reference to the future of Guiteau, the assassin. Mr Lowell's opinion that being a native of Columbia he should be dealt with by the law there.

Last night the following telegram was received from the Prince of Wales:—"We are concerned to learn from last telegrams that the President's condition is so precarious, and trust for better news."

The following is the official telegram which was received last night from Longbranch at the hour, namely, between 10 and 10.30:

"For the chill of last evening left him he was weak indeed. His pulse became more rapid and feeble than at any time since he recovered from the immediate shock of the wound, his general condition was more alarming. On the day his system has reacted to some extent and he passed the afternoon and evening comfortably. At this hour he is resting quietly, no disturbance is expected during the night. There has been however no gain whatever in this, and there is therefore no decrease of strength.—MACVEAGH."

A few minutes after receipt of this telegram came the following:—"The President has died.—WAYNE MACVEAGH."
