M P Leahy, S C S, prosecuted on behalf of town, and Messrs Curtin and McCarthy, Esq., appeared for the defendants.

Interest appeared to be manifested in the proceedings, and there were only ten extra police sent into the town.

The cases having been called, Mr Leahy said that, having regard to the lateness of the hour (1.30), and the fact that he was bound for the Limerick City Sessions on to-morrow, didn't think it was possible that his Worship would commence and finish the cases that evening. One he would ask him that under the circumstances to let them stand until next Petty Session.

McCarthy opposed the application, and Mr Leahy, in the interests of all parties, for the peace of the district, to have the summonses withdrawn.

Leahy said that his instructions were to attend and prosecute in the cases. Discretion not having been left with him, he could not, on his behalf, withdraw the summonses, so that he asked for an adjournment.

Consequence of the Kerry and Limerick interfering, it was ultimately agreed to adjourn the cases until the 27th July.

Before leaving, the chairman said he was sorry that all through the country the police and people have been in a state of variance. It was a very unseemly and very unpopular course for a constable to be calling names to the constabulary, who were merely doing their duty.
