HOMICIDE AT THE WORKHOUSE.

Mr Costelloe County Coroner, with a jury, held
an inquest to-day at 1.30, p.m., in the Board-room
of the Workhouse, on the body of a pauper named
James Walsh, who died on the 10th inst. from
injuries alleged to have been inflicted on him by
another pauper named Michael Hourigan (now in
custody), at the workhouse, on the 28th of April.
Sub-inspector Wilton and Head-constable Phelan
conducted the inquiry on behalf of the Crown. It
appeared from the evidence that on the day in
question the deceased with Hourigan and a num-
ber of male inmates were taking their breakfast
in No. 2 Ward, the deceased came behind one of
them, Michael M'Mahon, and asked why they
were not speaking. Hourigan told him (deceased)
to sit down and eat his breakfast. Walsh
called him names, whereupon Hourigan took up
a stick and struck him with it; they both then
went out on the middle of the floor, and imme-
diately after two of the inmates saw blood flowing
from Walsh's head. Hourigan raised the stick to
strike him a second time, but was prevented by
M'Mahon. Deceased was immediately taken to
the hospital, where he remained until Wednesday
last, when he succumbed to the injuries. The
man Hourigan was arrested by Head-constable
Phelan on the 3rd inst., when he stated that he
and the deceased had a quarrel the evening previ-
ous, and that deceased struck him with a pewter
pint; that it was renewed on the following day,
when he admitted that he struck deceased
with a stick. Dr. Barry deposed that the deceased
was admitted to the workhouse hospital on the
13th of April, suffering from a sore finger, and
was under his care from the following day until
the 10th May, when he died. He was nearly re-
covered on the 28th of April, but on that even-
ing witness found that he had a very severe wound
(contused), on the forehead. He also had a large
wound and three small ones on the head. The
bone was laid bare; the stick (produced) would
cause the wounds. He considered them very
serious, and he directed the man to go to bed, which
he did; erysipelas set in four days after the occur-
rence, and he died on the 10th inst. Witness,
assisted by Drs. Holmes, O'Connor, and Russell
made a *post mortem* examination on the body of
the deceased to-day, and they were of opinion that
death was caused by inflammation of the brain and
its membranes, resulting from erysipelas super-
vening on the injuries received. The jury found
the following verdict:—"That the said James
Walsh died in the Hospital, Limerick Union
Workhouse, on the 10th May inst., and that his
death was caused by erysipelas, which resulted
from wounds on his head inflicted by Michael
Hourigan on the 28th April last."
