**MISCELLANEOUS.**

The crisis on the Berlin Bourse continues, and the suicide of a leading banker at Hanover is announced.

During the past week 129 cases of small-pox were under treatment in the hospital of the union workhouse, Belfast.

It is stated that in consequence of the unforeseen difficulties attending the printing and publication of the *United Ireland* in Paris, it will be shortly transferred to Liverpool.

The Right Hon. G. J. Goschen has arrived in Berlin. It is said he is entrusted with a confidential mission with a view of discovering the extent of the good will of the German Government towards Turkey.

A youth named Westley was tried yesterday at Nottingham Assizes for the murder of his father and a fellow office boy. The defence of insanity was set up, but the jury found the prisoner guilty, and he was sentenced to death.

The provincial journals of France have condemned the action of the Chamber of Deputies in rejecting M. Gambetta's schemes of revision, and say that in Opposition M. Gambetta's power and influence will be almost as great as before.

Telegraphic instructions have been received at Chatham Dockyard directing that those workmen who were employed on that part of the Doterel which blew up are to proceed to Portsmouth to give evidence before the committee now sitting.

A bottle was picked up in Dundrum Bay yesterday, containing an envelope stating it was written as the steamer Edith, of Glasgow, was sinking in sight of the Kish Light, and was asked to communicate with the owners. It was signed "James Hanlon, master."

Mr Dillon, M.P., has written a letter to Mr. Forster requesting the latter not to trouble him with any more communications on the subject of his release from Kilmainham. The hon. member says he will never entertain any proposal of the kind to which the slightest condition is attached.

A sum of £200,000 was withdrawn from the Bank of England yesterday. Money had been very scarce all day owing to the bankers calling in their loans. This has forced most brokers to apply to the bank, which has charged those in good credit 7 per cent., and those in credit not so good 8 per cent., for accommodation.

At a special general meeting in Inverness yesterday the Caledonian Banking Company unanimously resolved to register under the old Companies Act as a limited liability company, under the title of the Caledonian Banking Company Limited. The capital was increased by raising the value of the present holdings from £620,000 to £775,000.

The news from Paris yesterday afternoon was of a more reassuring character, and accordingly the stock markets here experienced a sharp rebound towards the close of business. On the Bourse charges for deferring the delivery of stock were reported in several securities, and accompanying this it is stated that the settlement will be carried through with less difficulty than had been supposed.

The *Daily News*' correspondent says a deficit of 96 million francs is mentioned in connection with the Union Generale. Not a coin of any sort was found in the cash boxes. It seems probable that some great personages who inflated the Union Generale are now on the path to the assize court. One reason of the embargo
