#### DEATH OF MR. GEO. BUNBURY, LIEUT. 4TH BRIGADE GARRISON ARTILLERY.

The many friends of the Dean of Limerick and  
Mrs Bunbury sympathise with them deeply in  
the loss of their youngest son, just on the  
threshold of manhood. Mr George Bunbury,  
who had successfully passed all the previous  
literary tests, was a candidate at the final ex-  
amination for a Commission in the Line held last  
week. At the close of the first day of examination  
he was completely exhausted, and his strength  
broke down under the very severe strain both of  
body and mind. He had worked very hard for  
months in order to pass this last ordeal as he had  
passed the others. His strength and resolution  
sustained him up to the day of examination,  
when nature, overtaxed, gave way, the strong  
young man was prostrated, and died on Wednes-  
day morning at the early age of twenty years. Mr  
George Bunbury was a lieutenant in the Limerick  
City Artillery, and was most popular in the  
regiment both with officers and men. His  
amiable disposition and gentlemanlike manners  
justly endeared him to every one with whom he  
came in contact. Gentle and guileless to a
