**A SUBSTITUTE FOR DYNAMITE.**—A citizen of Paris claims to have produced, in a new compound which he calls panclastite, a means of destruction altogether surpassing dynamite. Panclastite consists of hypoazotic acid, which is one of the numerous compounds of oxygen and azote or nitrogen, mixed either with essence of petroleum or sulphuret of carbon. The degree of explosive force is said to depend upon which of the last-named ingredients is used. Before he is at liberty to make and sell his destructive compound the inventor requires the licence of the Seine Hygienic Council. That body have, however, refused to grant it, on the ground of indefiniteness in the patentee's specifications and inexplicitness in his statements as to the objects to which the invention is to be applied.
