On Wednesday evening a young man named

to report the matter to the police, but they com-  
pelled him to go home. He went as far as Knock-  
achur Police Barracks and reported the matter to  
the police there, who informed the Sub-Inspector  
at Castle Island. The Castle Island police turned  
out immediately and scoured the country, but up  
to the present, there is no trace of the missing  
guns. A young man named Sullivan was arrested  
and released.

According to the report of the Registrar-  
General, for the week ending 18th instant, seven-  
teen births have been registered for this city and

mortality five were under the age of twelve

The average annual death-rate represented by the  
deaths registered last week in the sixteen princi-
