SUDDEN DEATH OF MR THOMAS FAGAN.

Mr Thomas Fagan, one of the Registrars of the Court of Bankruptcy in Dublin, and Clerk of the Crown and Peace for the City of Limerick, died suddenly this morning. He had but just returned from a two months' vacation trip. He was appointed Clerk of the Crown and Peace for Limerick in 1861, but the duties of the office have been discharged by a deputy for some years.

In the Bankruptcy Court, this morning, Judge Walsh, on taking his seat, made a feeling reference to the deceased gentleman. Mr Fagan was, indeed, he said, an able officer, and would the nature of the business have allowed he would have adjourned the court as a mark of respect to him. High loss to the profession as well as to him would be seriously felt. Mr John Murray, as the senior solicitor present, joined in the expression of regret, as did also Mr Isaac Weir, Q.C., on behalf of the bar, and Mr Deering, as the only official assignee present.
