DEATH OF MR. JOHN MACKERN.

Who among us does not feel grieved, deeply grieved, at learning of the decease, which took place at Oreland on Sunday forenoon, of this universally esteemed gentleman. Possessed of a temperament with so much of sunshine in it, so much of true sympathy for those who needed it. so much of all those rare qualities which make men appreciated among their fellow-men. Mr Mackern occupied a position in his native city which very few may hope to emulate, none to surpass. Presiding over an extensive publishing firm, which for many years past has enjoyed a reputation second to none, executing a large amount of public work, the decease of Mr. Mackern - albeit he had come to his grave "in a full old age, like as a stock of corn cometh in in his season"-may justly be regarded as being a public loss, and will certainly be deplored as such. Since the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland, Mr Mackern, among other offices, held that important one of Diocesan Treasurer, and his long and continuous connexion with the choir of St. Mary's Cathedral, where his sonorous bass voice was so much appreciated, deserves more than a passing reference. Previous to an accident which occurred to him something over twelve months ago, the deceased was in the enjoyment of full mental and physical vigour; and certainly he spared neither in the fulfilment of his many and onerous duties. injuries sustained upon the occasion referred to he never got over; but though incapacitated from taking his wonted exercise, his mental faculties and his high animal spirits remained with him unsubdued to the last. The story of his passing away is highly characteristic of that temperament and those domestic traits which so distinguished him in life. During Sunday morning he was in the enjoyment of his ordinary health, and in the forenoon Mrs Mackern was reading for him a note which she had just received from their granddaughter. Some pleasant bursts of innocent merriment it contained caused the old man to indulge in one of those hearty laughs which it was so refreshing to listen to. Almost immediately afterwards he complained of an intense heat in his head, and in a little time peacefully expired, surrounded by the several members of his family, to whom he was bound by no ordinary ties of attachment. Dwelling upon such a life, so prosperous and happy, adorned with the unfeigned respect of all classes, closed with a departure so unclouded, passing away in a ripe old age from the rest of the Sabbath morning to the enjoyment of the rest that remaineth for the people of God, one is apt involuntarily to breathe the fervent wish, "May my last end be like his."
