The object of the deputation in poming before the Commissioners was to sak them to erect a building on the Green, where people could go in and transact their business, pay manage and so forth and also that the Befresh money, and so forth, and also that the Refresh-ment Rooms Company should have the use of a compartment in the house, where tea and coffee could be sold. He need hardly say, if what the deputation suggested were done, it would prove a great convenience to the public.

The Chairman said he entirely endorsed the

views of the deputation so clearly put forward by Mr Hunt, but he regretted to say the Commissioners could not entertain the matter, which lay in the hands of the Grand Jury. He, however, suggested that the deputation should go before the Grand Jury and put the question before

them.
