## DEATH OF A CASTLECONNELL NO-TORIETY.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

On the evening of Sunday last there passed away at the house of Michael McDonough, a workman in the employment of Mr R. J. Gabbett. Caherline, a notoriety, Paddy Ryan, well known to anglers and tourists visiting Castleconnell by the sobriquet "Paddy the Black." short sketch of Paddy's career will be scanned with interest by your numerous readers. He was born at Bushfield, within 5 miles of Nenagh, in or about the year 1827. When quite a boy he was employed as a valet to Mr Gallway, Killabee (father to Mr Gallway, late S.I., R.I.C, Limerick), which position he did not seemingly care for, as he was compelled to wear boots, which, even to his last moments, he considered a useless and injurious portion of his attire. At the age of 26 he was induced by a recruiting sergeant to take the Queen's shilling, by whom he was enlisted in the 30th Regiment. Immediately after, his regiment volunteered for the Crimea, under the command of Colonel Dillon, whose name, with that of the late Captain Stamer, Gubbins, of same regiment, was always on his tongue for kindness. which he had experienced at their hands. He boasted frequently of his army life, and recounted some of the Crimean battles with avidity, though he was not to the front when any of the engagements were going on. Immediately after the Crimas, Paddy was discharged from his regiment, it is said on account of his great tendency for being bootless and his aversion to cold water. Ever since his discharge he has been constantly in attendance at the Shannon Hotel doing errands, and acting the role of guide to those who would (and those who would not) be strangers in that locality. Every person in and around Castleconnell are sorry for poor Paddy's death.
