The emigration returns, which are now made up monthly, show that during June the total number of emigrants was 49,051 against 47,658 in June 1882. Of these 18,000 were English and 16,000 Irish. As usual, the preponderance was in favour of the United States, and it is noticeable that more than 12,000 Irish selected that destination against 9,000 English, while over 4,000 English, but only 800 Irish went to Australia.

A very curious mistake was made last Saturday during the ceremony of marriage at the Savoy Chapel Royal, between the Ven. H. W. Watkins, Archdeacon and Canon of Durham, and Miss Kate Thompson, daughter of Sir Henry Thompson. According to the story, one of the officiating clergymen in the act of tying the nuptial knot, said with great solemnity "These whom God hath joined asunder let no man put together," and was unconsciously proceeding with the service, when the Rev Henry White, with much quiet tact, directed his attention to the blunder, whereupon the injunction was re-delivered in its correct form.
