

and this indeed has been the wreck of this splendid vessel beneath the Cape Clear Light of May last, and her subsequent at the time was considered. For some time after the wreck a large staff of men, with divers, engaged in endeavouring to put their efforts (even with the use of dynamite) proved of little avail. The expenditure was more than £1000, and it was decided to auction the vessel and the vessel as a general cargo on board, in the hands of Wm Coakley, auctioneer, put up for sale, and after some brisk bidding by Liverpool and local buyers, a sale took place, and the vessel was sold in the names of Messrs J. O'Shea, Liverpool, for £333. The cargo was — Messrs Atherton, Liverpool; J. O'Shea, Baltimore; and Peter Burnett, Skibbereen, of whom has since fallen out, for £100 clear. The purchase was effected by procuring a steam tug from Liverpool, and the cargo, namely, Messrs Michael, Cork; and Martin, Queensboro, as the success attending the sale of the local divers (whilst the vessel was a failure), that the Limerick Company's steamer Vale of Bandon is going plying the goods to the present some thousands of different descriptions of goods, even though only a few holds access to, and from a perusal of which is, indeed, a ferruginous little more than a sample has been made. The cargo consists of large quantities of whiskey, brandy, ale, porter, bicycles and tricycles, galvanized iron, bales of fishing line, barrels of wire rigging, large crates of wing saws, tons of pig iron, and the remainder is recovered in tons, satin of which fetched £140, Hessian of human hair which has been sold at 3s per oz, &c. The expectations are of the happiest character.
