FUNERAL OF MR JAMES ALEXANDER.

Yesterday morning all that was mortal of the late Mr James Alexander was laid in the family place of interment at the Friends' burial ground at Ballinacurra. The funeral cortege left Beech-lawn at half-past nine o'clock, accompanied by an exceedingly large and representative retinue, comprising members of several county families, city merchants and traders, bankers and professional men, who, despite the severity of the morning, assembled in unwonted numbers to pay their last mark of respect to the honoured deceased. The remains having reached St Michael's Church, were removed from the hearse, and placed upon a catafalque in the aisle of the sacred building. The funeral service of the Church of Ireland was then read by the Very Rev the Dean, assisted by the Venerable the Archdeacon. The coffin having been again removed to the hearse, the procession proceeded to the Friends' burial ground, where the larger number of those present collected around the open grave. Previous to the interment taking place, Mr Thomas Fisher, one of the ministers of the Society of Friends, delivered a most impressive and appropriate address, which was followed by another from a minister of the same body residing in Cork. The coffin was then lowered into the grave amid solemn silence, unbroken except by suppressed ejaculations of resigned sorrow for him who had exchanged life for immortality.

SIR JOHN ARNOTT'S BAKERY.

Yesterday the much-talked of bakery in Bedford Row belonging to Sir John Arnott was opened for the sale of bread, and the result of the first day's operations must be highly satisfactory to the owner of the establishment. Although bread was given away for two or three days previous to Friday no money was received for it until yesterday. The establishment was opened at 8 o'clock a.m., and from that hour till 7 p.m., when the bakery was closed, there was a continuous demand for the bread and flour vended. Seven or eight counter hands were kept fully employed serving loaves, and the 18 bakers working at the factory were equally busy. It was found at the end of the day that over 2,000 pairs of loaves or 8,000 lbs of bread at 4½d per 4 lb had been sold, and that over a ton of flour, at prices varying from 1s 3d, 1s 6d, and 1s 8d per stone, had been disposed of in quantities of 7 lbs and a stone. The customers were with scarcely an exception, members of the poorer, if not the poorest, classes of the community; but all the purchasers seemed well pleased with the value they obtained for their coppers.
