Good—Did you swear in your information having been referred to, it was the prisoner threw the tumbler? No, I did not. The witness did swear the tumbler was thrown at Sergeant Good.

Finn, a son of the last witness, gave evidence.

Good deposed that on the day after returning from Limerick he went to the prisoner's house for a short time. As he went out he heard something strike the tumbler. On the morning round he saw Griffin drawing the tumbler. He deposed at the court that Reddan was the man who threw the tumbler.

A man named Co-grave was examined and stated that to the best of his knowledge he did not throw the tumbler. He swore positively he did not throw it. The Finn's sworn was false. He was sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

**FACTION FIGHTING.**

John Ryan, junior, was charged with wounding Thomas Ryan, at Oola, on the 15th instant.

John Ryan deposed—On the 15th August I was in the public house of Catherine Ryan, said county; Michael Laffan was with me as about to go home I saw the prisoner with Daniel Ryan; I drew back, and when all was quiet I and Laffan left to go home. Ryan and Thomas Gorman were with each other; prisoner then released Gorman ran across the road, caught me, and knocked me on the channel; I lost my senses, and know nothing more about it when I recovered my senses I found myself in the police barrack at Oola; I was then leading from the head; I have two wounds on the head.

Thomas McDonald deposed—On the 15th I was on duty in the village of Oola; I started to five o'clock in the evening I was standing at the cross of Oola, and while I was standing there I saw John Ryan (minor) and Edward Ryan if they were about to fight with other men who were there also; I saw John Ryan as Mrs Ryan's door and catch hold of the door, of Monroe, and knock him down by a pavement; Ryan again caught hold of me, and knocked his head on the pavement; Nash was bleeding. The prisoner was returned for trial.

Griffin pleaded guilty to having assaulted John M'Grath at Doon on the 8th instant. On the assault was in consequence of having prosecuted Griffin's brother at the sessions, the accused was sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labour.

**MALICIOUS INJURY TAX.**

Parties were processed for recovery of the tax levied upon them by way of compensation to Mary Anne Roche, whose husband, Emergeedy bailiff, was murdered at Doon in 1882, and which they refused to pay. The tax was granted in each case.
