DEATH OF MR WILLIAM COCHRANE.

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of our much respected fellow townsman, Mr William Cochrane. A native of the North of Ireland, more than fifty years ago he came to our city, occupied a prominent position in the commercial world, and maintained an unblemished reputation for sterling integrity. He took an interest in the promotion of the welfare of the city, and was active as a Harbour Commissioner and member of the Chamber of Commerce. As a philanthropist he was well known, and was one of the promoters of that valuable and unsectarian society called the "Protestant Aid," which has a home for the poor, and every winter a large fund for supplying the needy with coal. To this institution his valuable services were ungrudgingly given. He was a member of the Methodist Church, George street, and by his co-religionists was held in the highest esteem, and for many years was elected representative to the Conference. For several weeks he was laid aside by a painful illness, but, up to the last, hopes were entertained that he would rally. However, on Thursday unfavourable symptoms set in, and he rapidly sank, and died in great peace on Friday morning, sustained all through his illness by that religion which he professed and loved to proclaim in his health and strength. The funeral will leave Barrington street on Monday at 10 o'clock, and proceed to the Methodist Church, George street, where service will be conducted, after which the funeral cortege will leave for Kilmurry, where the interment will take place. On Sunday evening week (14th inst) a funeral sermon will be preached by the Rev Wm Nicholas.
