THE AMERICAN MAILS.

Following letter has been received from the Post Office:—

“General Post Office, London, 26th July, 1884.

I am directed to inform you that the General has had before him your letter of the 16th ultimo, in which the Cork Chamber of Commerce and Shipping represents a representation recently made to them by the Queen's own Town Committee with the object of retaining the establishment, via Queenstown, for the conveyance of American mails.

The Postmaster-General replied on the 15th to the application of the Queenstown Chamber of Commerce, a new agreement has been made with the Great Southern and Western Railway, which will come into operation on the 1st of October next, under which special trains will be run as formerly, up to 12.30, from Queenstown to Cork, and from Cork to Dublin up to overtake the night mail. While from this date the accelerated day mail between Queenstown and Dublin will leave Queenstown at 10.30.

So that there will be no necessity for special trains up to 1 p.m., as proposed by the Chamber.

The new arrangements will greatly improve the American mail service via Queenstown, and that route so efficient as to remove in a measure the disadvantage which is now sometimes experienced in carrying the English and Scotch mails to Liverpool on board the packet—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,
