...nell was again examined. Mr Poland produced five documents which had been found since last week, but these did not appear to be of a very important character. Witnesses were then called to speak of to the movements of the prisoners prior to arrest, and evidence was given as to the letter produced being in the handwriting of the prisoners.

Sergeant Ore, who was employed watching the prisoners, said that Egan, in addressing an Irish meeting in a public house, said, "This night we shall be avenged." Next day they had news of an explosion at Victoria Station, London. Colonel Majendie said he examined the parcel handed him by the police, and found on the prisoner Daly. It contained six small bottles of brownish fluid and some tubes, the whole forming an infernal machine of a most destructive character.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The remains of Dr Goodford, late Provost of Eaton College, will be interred next Wednesday, at Eton Cemetery. Masters, officials, and whole school, numbering nearly 1,000, will follow.

Mr John Caxton, the well-known warder of Raglan Castle, died suddenly last night. He attended Lord Raglan's funeral, on Thursday.

A Central News' telegram, dated Rome, Saturday, says—Giovani Prati, the Italian poet laureate, is dead.

At the London Bankruptcy Court, to-day, the failure was announced of John Mare, shipbuilder, of Finsbury Circus and Bartholomew's House. The liabilities are reported to be heavy.

The barque Aspirant, of South Shields, has been totally wrecked on the Lemon and Ower Sands. All the crew were saved, having got on board the Lemon and Ower light-ship.
