We regret to announce the death after a long
and painful illness of Mrs Madden, Postmistress,
Castleconnell, at the age of 68 years. The de-
ceased was deservedly respected during the pro-
tracted term of her official life. The remains
will be laid in Castleconnell churchyard to-
morrow at three o'clock. The Madden family, we
learn, have had charge of the Castleconnell Post
Office almost without interruption since '98. For
a lengthened time Mrs Madden has been unable
to perform the duties of her office, which have
been discharged in the meantime without
assistance by her daughter, Miss Julia Madden,
to the entire satisfaction of the public and postal
authorities. It is the sincere wish of all parties
in and around Castleconnell, that the long and
faithful services of the family will not be over-
looked, and that Miss Julia Madden will without
delay be appointed to the now vacant office.

Outrages of an agrarian character in the county
of Limerick would seem to be of rather frequent
occurrence of late. We understand that a few
mornings since a number of notices were found
posted up in the village of Shanagolden calling
on the shopkeepers and "every patriotic Irish-
man" to boycott a man named Lane in conse-
quence of his having supplied a horse to till a
garden for the carefaker on the farm from which
Mr Daniel J Hishon (Organizer to the National
League) was evicted two years ago. Although
the evicted farm has been in possession of a
carefaker named Reynolds for some time past no
attempt was made to interfere with him or any
person connected with it until a short time ago,
when it became known that the agent, Mr Furn-
nell, attempted to save the hay on the land, which
he was subsequently successful in doing. Since
commencement of the hay-making everything was
resorted to in order to prevent a number of
labourers who were engaged by Mr Furnell work-
ing on the farm, but the labourers, who found it
no easy matter to get work to do in the locality,
very wisely remained in Mr Furnell's employ-
ment until the crop was saved. The threatening
notices on being discovered were at once taken
down by the police, but no clue has been obtained
which would lead to the arrest of the writer of
them.
