

they went in through Murphy's back gate, and the door was closed against them, and they were not admitted; they were outside the gate and met two young men named Bourke and Roughan, and were speaking to them when Constable Fitzgerald came up and struck Moylan with a stick; "why did you hit me?" said Moylan; "I will" said Fitzgerald, "and hit you again;" Moylan put up his hand and began to cry; Fitzgerald turned round to witness and said "you, too, Glynn," and struck him with his stick.

Mr Healy—We have a doctor's certificate to show the injuries Mr Glynn received.

Mr O'Meehan—It is not evidence. Produce the doctor himself.

Mr Healy—Doctor Hynes could not be here owing to professional engagements.

Mr Purcell said he could not receive a certificate.

The witness said he could show the bruises on his arm from the blows; Fitzgerald said "go now to 'Thomasheen' Cleary and put me in the *Independent*, as you did before, and if that don't do you, you can go to Charley Parnell and the House of Commons" (laughter); Fitzgerald was punching him in the chest and broke the glass of his watch; they had a conversation to-day about the case; they did not arrive at the conclusion what they would swear; there was no subscription made up in Clare Castle to prosecute the case; it could not be done without his hearing of it; he would hear it if it occurred.

Patrick Roughan gave similar testimony.

Patrick Bourke was the next witness. He also gave evidence of the assault on Moylan; Fitzgerald struck him on the head with a stick; heard him say "go to Thomasheen Cleary and Charley Parnell."

Jeremiah Lalor deposed that he drove Fitzgerald and another constable named Harrington to Quin that day on a post car; they went into a public house there; could not say how long they remained in the public house.

Cross-examined—Fitzgerald's sister and another girl were driving with them; Fitzgerald was sober.

Mr O'Meehan then went into a rebutting case, and examined Constable Jeremiah Donovan, who deposed that Fitzgerald asked him to go to Murphy's public house that he suspected there were persons drinking there; he found Glynn and Moylan in the yard; he went in the back gate, Fitzgerald went in the front door, and found him in the yard; they both passed out through the house and went to the barrack; was in company with Fitzgerald all the time, and did not see him strike any person; could not account for anything that happened after he left his company; did not hear Moylan complain of being assaulted.

Cross-examined—Fitzgerald did not go out by

in consequence of the exposure of carcasses of horses and other animals on the strand and near the public thoroughfares. The relieving officer, who also acts as sanitary inspector, has been asked to have the carcass of a horse which presents a most unsightly appearance removed off the strand. It would be well if the subject was brought under the notice of the Board of Guardians, in order that they might devise some means to ensure better sanitary supervision in the district than there is at present.

**KILDYSART BUTTER MARKET.**

The supply of butter at this market on Thursday was small. Sellers were unwilling to have their butter subject to weighing, and also to the stripping of the firkins in the "square," where a machine was erected for the weighing process, resulting in the buyers—Messrs O'Halloran and Kennelly, Ennis—leaving the market without buying a single firkin. About a dozen firkins were afterwards bought by a local buyer named Cleary, at prices varying from 46s to 48s per firkin.
