ROADS IN THE SUBURBS.—THE DUST.

TO THE EDITOR, LIMERICK CHRONICLE.
SIR,—Now that the Corporation have got a better supply of the city into their own hands, it policies may devoutly be hoped to be in force for a little while, is it reasonable to suppose that any attempt will be made to lay the roads in the suburbs? The condition of the roads in Limerick, loaded as they are with dust, put it mildly—anything but a credit to the government of the Corporation, and could not be in any community of importance in the country.

A dust grievance on the Military Road, and South Circular Roads, and other notable sections of the Borough (bless the Lord) is an old standing one, but latterly it has become intolerable. What a shame it is, dear Sir, to heavily taxed citizens who presume to live in the suburbs for their health's sake should, the fine weather opens, be praying that the Pluvius may come and do the work that the authorities, one would suppose, were to have carried out. Truly the apathy of citizens to their own interests, and requirements, is very marked in Limerick.

Under if occupiers and proprietors of houses localities that suffer were to combine and to pay "Improvement Rates" on the roads that they receive no value for their property, would they have a *locus standi* against the Corporation, or would such action be best suited to cause the latter to a sense of their rate duties? I submit that it ought to be on the same principle that the Town Council is now resisting a certain objectionable item.

It may be said that the streets are in the hands of contractors, and that the Corporation are out of business. Even so. Why are George-street and two others of the principal thoroughfares alone favoured with visits from the watering-
