## THE WAR IN THE SOUDAN.

Souakim, Tuesday.—The Utopia, Rinalds and Osiris sail to-day for Suez with General Graham and troops. The Black Watch will embark to-morrow in the Orontes.

## THE OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE CREWS.

The Cambridge crew this morning pulled hard from Hammersmith Bridge to Putney at 35 strokes per minute. The water below the Soap Works was extremely lumpy. They rowed a scratch crew to the Craven steps, the scratch taking a length's lead and keeping it throughout. The Cambridge then went on at 36 to Crexford, and rowed from Grave Park Boathouse at 36 to Hammersmith in 13 mins 20 secs, going well. The rough water did not suit them going back.

Sir Frederick Johnson, MP, is suffering from an attack of pluro-pneumonia.

Miss Marie Litton (Mrs Wybrow Robertson) died this morning in London. Deceased was formerly lessee and manageress of the Court Theatre, and afterwards manageress of the Imperial Theatre.

At a council meeting of the Associated Chambers of Agriculture, held in London to-day, a resolution was carried unanimously strongly objecting to any alteration of the Contagious Diseases Animals Bill, which would reduce safeguards against the importation of disease, being inserted by the House of Lords.

At a meeting of City Commissioners of Sewerage to-day, a motion was unanimously adopted instructing the Sanitary Committee to consider the expediency of erecting a crematorium in the City of London. The motion was carried by a vote of 10 to 8.
