DEATH OF DR T RIORDAN.

We regret to announce in this day's issue the
 death of Thomas Travers Riordan, M D, which
 occurred at Marksbury, in Somerset, on the 10th
 July. Dr Riordan was for many years medical
 officer of the Annacotty and Castleconnell Dis-
 pensary District. The following is a reprint from
 this journal of a resolution adopted at a meeting
 of the Annacotty Dispensary Committee, held at
 Castleconnell, on the occasion of his resigning
 the appointment in 1864:—

Proposed by Sir Richard DeBurgh, Bart; sec-
 onded by Right Hon Lord Massy:—"That the
 thanks of the Annacotty Dispensary Committee
 be notified to Dr Thomas Riordan for his uniform
 attention to the medical requirements of the
 district, whose high qualifications, large experi-
 ence and talent, must, in the opinion of the
 committee, render him a singularly valuable
 acquisition to any locality which may be so for-
 tunate as to obtain his services."

Proposed by J S Dwyer; seconded by Wm
 Corbett—"That the above resolution be inserted
 in the *Limerick Chronicle*."
 Dr Riordan married on the 10th October, 1833,
 Anne Hussey de Burgh, who died on the 9th
 February, 1870, only daughter of the Rev John
 Hussey Burgh, of Donore, county Kildare, and
 Dromkeen, county Limerick, who was the only
 son of the Chief Baron, Walter Hussey Burgh.

LIMERICK REGATTA.

This local event, which comes off on Monday

 Rowing Club will compete in the race for junior
 pairs. In the "Aspirants" race the entries are
 the same as in the last mentioned event. A com-
 modious grand stand has been erected near the
 pier of the Shannon Rowing Club, from which the
 regatta will be held for the accommodation of
 spectators. The band of the Oxfordshire Light
 Infantry, under Mr Richards, will perform a
 choice selection each day.
