

... were taken into custody, as stated in our last issue, on the charge of maiming some cattle, the property of two brothers named Casey, were since taken before Mr Purcell, R M, of Ennis, and the information of the prosecutors having been made, they were returned for trial to the Winter Assizes, bail being refused. Their solicitor, however, will, it is stated, have a bail motion made before the Court of Queen's Bench as soon as possible. The accused have been committed to Limerick gaol awaiting trial.

LOWER BUNRATTY PRESENTMENT SESSIONS.

The half yearly presentment sessions for the barony of Lower Bunratty, in the county of Clare, was held on Thursday, at Newmarket on Fergus, Major J Studdert, Newmarket, in the chair. The other magistrates present were—Mr Robert O'Brien Studdert, Major Robert Ashford Studdert, Kilkishen House; Mr Solomon Frost, Captain Studdert, R N. There was a large attendance of cesspayers. Mr Hall, County Surveyor, who was present, declined to certify for sums claimed under contract for the repairs of certain roads in the barony on the ground that the contracts were not properly carried out. The magistrates under these circumstances declined to pass the presentments for the amounts. The other road presentments were adopted, there being no objection on the part of Mr Hall. There was only one malicious injury presentment on the list, which was an application by a farmer named Bowles for 5 compensation for a calf, his property, which was found dead on the lands of Baherose some time ago. The applicant stated that there was a person residing in the locality whom he believed to be an ill-feeling against him. The dead animal had a wound on the forehead, but when and how inflicted there was no evidence to show. Mr Devereux, V.S, Ennis, was examined on the part of the ratepayers, who opposed the presentment on the ground that it was not malicious. He gave evidence to the effect that the heifer died from disease of the spine, and that the wound on the forehead would not be sufficient to cause death. The presentment was ultimately rejected, it being held that malice was not proved. This concluded the business of the court.

Her Majesty's ship *Serapis*, now on passage from Bombay and expected to reach Portswater on the 8th prox, will sail on the 17th of November instead of the Crocodile with the fleet.

The session of 1884-5, of Magee College, Derry, was formally opened yesterday, when Rev Dr Ennis, President of Faculty, delivered an inaugural address on the subject "An Hour with the Critics."

An extraordinary quantity of herrings was brought off Yarmouth a couple of days ago. The bulk of the day's take, going by even the low average price of a halfpenny per herring, would amount to some £55,000.
