**IMPORTED OYSTERS.**

The *Irish Times* says :—Lovers of oysters in  
this country have been congratulating them-  
selves on the recent enterprise which enabled  
them between the end of May and beginning of  
September to have the opportunity of indulging  
their appetites for the delicious bivalve through  
Dutch or American importations. But the  
Inspectors of Irish Fisheries have put their veto  
on a continuance of this luxury during the  
summer months—for they have just issued a  
cautionary notice to the proprietors of hotels  
and restaurants, wherein the board sets out that  
it has come to their knowledge that within the  
prohibited period—namely, the months that do  
not contain the coercive letter "r," oysters have  
been sold in Dublin. They point out that under  
the Act of Parliament dealing with oyster culture  
in Ireland it is contrary to law to expose for sale  
or sell any oysters during the close season, and  
they warningly refer to the penalty for dis-
